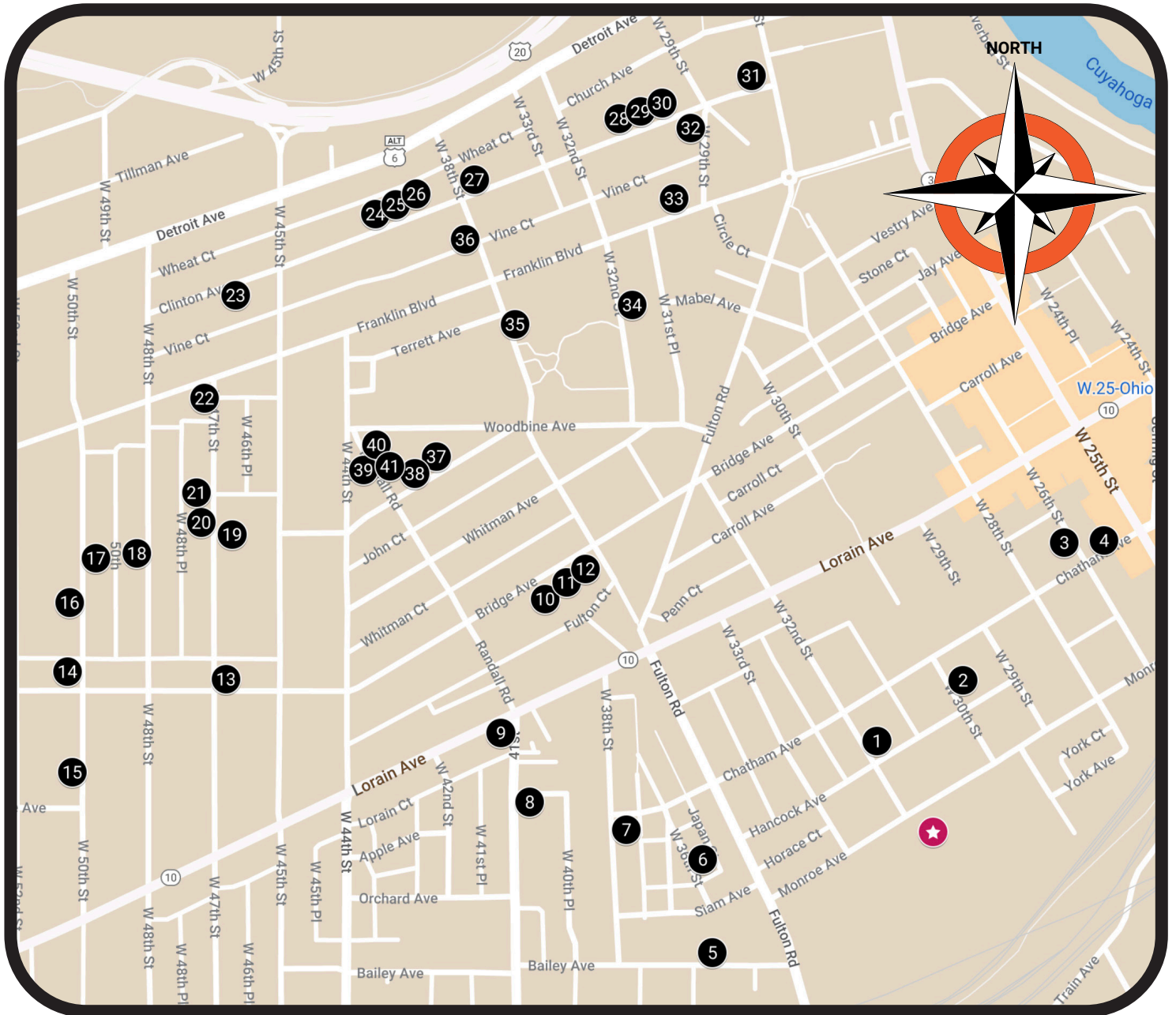

Ohio City

One of Cleveland's older neighborhoods, Ohio City (known then as City of Ohio) was founded in 1818. On March 3, 1836, two days before Cleveland's incorporation, the City of Ohio became an independent municipality. It remained so until June 5, 1854, when it was annexed to Cleveland.

Now home to 10,000 residents, 100 nonprofits, 200 small businesses, Centennial landmarks including the Cleveland Public Library's Carnegie West Branch, the West Side Market, and the 6-acre Ohio City Farm, one of the largest contiguous urban farms in the country, Ohio City boasts extreme diversity and opportunities for engagement. Whether you are retired empty-nesters, newly-graduated youngsters, singles or families, there is something for everyone from educational and spiritual facilities to restaurants and shops and more than 14 green spaces, gardens, and parks all within 3 blocks of walking distance from each other.

★ Information Station – Monroe Street Cemetery, 3207 Monroe Ave

Monroe Street Cemetery is maintained by volunteers dedicated to the preservation and enhancement of the oldest public cemetery on Cleveland's west side.

1 2173 W 32nd St

Home garden created in coordination with total house renovation. Garden includes multiple perennial, annual and tree varieties. All which have been planted since 2018!

2 2157 W 30th St

Cottage house, cottage garden.

3 2084 W 26 St

Double lot. Japanese garden inspired. gridded brick vegetable garden with fountain. large koi pond in the back with deck that cantilevers over one end of the pond.

4 2097 W 26th St – STAR GARDENER

The garden is a collection of traditional, colorful perennials and annuals and flowering trees. Many architectural pieces salvaged from the neighborhood and within the city add to the interest of the tranquil space. Hidden corners and pockets in the yards all host a variety of plantings!

5 3636 Bailey Ave

My tiny front yard is landscaped without any grass. Two of the four urban size friendly trees new to the property are in the front as well. Lots of pavers (or the driveway) will get you to the small vegetable garden in the back. This is the third summer for this yard.

6 2203 W 36th St

Featuring a native rain garden, emerging tree canopy, and natural food sources and habitat for birds, insects, reptiles, and mammals, we hope this garden will inspire you to let a little wild into your life!

7 2149 W 38th St

Le Petit Jardin A small urban oasis in the South of Lorain area. It has several varieties of Japanese maples and tree peonies.

9 The D. H. Ellison Co – 2002 W 41st St

Linear plantings along fence line and against buildings, perennials.

10 3821 Bridge Ave

This in progress garden focuses on a mixture of ornamental, pollinator and vegetable species with a focus on environmental impact.

11 3817 Bridge Ave

This little urban garden is an oasis for pollinators and house sparrows (who live in the bush next door). Featuring: flowers, herbs, native grasses, and an ivy-covered fence. Sam, Whit, and Boki (the cat) watch over this little plot of land, and they feel so fortunate to call their home.

12 3807 Bridge Ave

3807 Bridge was built in 1868, but native wildlife has grown in this space since the end of the last ice age. My intent is to transition to native perennials that may have always thrived on this land, but I occasionally take liberties with well-behaved flowers I love and plants that were already here.

13 1915 West 47th St

Tiny landscape with delightful "garden porch."

14 5004 Bridge Ave

An evolving urban homestead, with a New England style side yard fruit and vegetable garden, surrounded by native pollinator friendly plants.

- 15 1924 W 50th St**
My attempt at creating the perfect English garden. I have lots of flowers that include roses, dahlias, cosmos, zinnias, stonecrop, foxglove, hostas, and more. Working in my garden is the ultimate hobby.
- 16 1840 W 50th St**
I've been working the garden for 3 years. It's organic. The front yard and tree lawn are all perennials, side and back yards have perennials and a small vegetable garden, in the back is a peach tree, blueberry bush and raspberry bush. Behind the garage is a compost pile. Folks can walk anywhere.
- 17 1823 W 50th St**
This is a heavily shaded garden with a few spots of sun peeking through now and then. The garden has raised beds for vegetables and is filled with many ferns and wildflowers gathered along the creeks of southeastern Ohio.
- 18 1834 W 48th St**
My garden is full of flowers in the front, of my house.
- 19 1843 W 47th St**
East meets west and city meets country in this cozy "collector's garden."
- 20 1836 W 47 St**
25 years of collecting bricks, pavers, metal objects and plants have allowed the owner to create a private cottage garden. Fire pit with seating, dining outdoors, and great seating for reading or just listening to birds. Plants include day lilies, arugula, rose of sharon, hostas, and roses.
- 21 W 47th Street Community garden**
1822 W 47th St
18 plots and community for both gardeners and community members use! We've been here over 20 years and have only gotten stronger with the years as an asset in the community!
- 22 1780 West 47th St**
Landscaped with a koi pond, numerous decorative shrubs and plants as well as a tomato garden, fig trees and a seedless grapevine.
- 23 4603 Clinton Ave**

- 24 4006 Clinton Ave**
A delightful hidden oasis in that combines old world charm with a modern flair. A sandstone patio with a raised deck is surrounded by flowers and greenery. It is the perfect spot to escape from the hustle of everyday life.
- 25 4002 Clinton Ave**
A riot of color in no particular order meets the viewers eyes. The garden at this house blooms from spring through fall giving the owner much enjoyment and tranquility.
- 26 3910 Clinton Ave**
This is a beginners garden used to keep us cool in summer and reminding us of what is to come in the winter. While it's still a work in progress, we are happy to share what we do have for our great neighborhood!
- 27 3704 Clinton Ave**
Urban courtyard with beds combining perennials and vegetables.
- 28 3018 Clinton Ave**
For the past 15 years, we've been converting our yard to plants, shrubs and trees, combining perennials, annuals for color, and a slow conversion to native species. Features include a garden room designed by local architect Chris Toddy; a small stone patio; wandering paths; hemlock and pawpaw trees.
- 29 3008 Clinton Ave**
Flower garden in our front yard
- 30 3002 Clinton Ave**
Our garden has evolved over 55 years at this address. At one time it featured bridal wreath bushes, at another peonies. Plants come and go, but we've always tried to have roses, a personal favorite. We enjoy tending our garden, and enjoy even more compliments from passersby.
- 31 Kaki's Garden at Malachi House**
2810 Clinton Ave
This urban garden provides the therapeutic benefits of nature to the residents at Malachi House as well as the community. Volunteer Horticulturist, Bob Rensel, and the Gardeners of Greater Cleveland transformed the curb into a serene garden in honor of our Co-Founder, Catherine O'Neill.

- 32 2901 Clinton Ave**
This mostly shaded corner is home to an evolving perennial garden. Highlights of the garden include the decades old lilac in the spring and the ten Incrediball hydrangeas flanking the front facade in the summer. Echinacea, phlox, joe weed, and assorted ferns bloom throughout the season.

English cottage garden
- 34 1711 W 32nd St**
We've been slowly reworking our backyard and adjoining lot to an oasis of mostly perennial plants, trees and shrubs. We're adding local and pollinator-friendly plants. Our vision is rivers and streams of grass winding among islands of flowers. Very much still a work-in-progress.
- 35 Kentucky Gardens
1645 West 38th St**
OPEN 11:00- 3:00 pm. Kentucky Gardens is the second oldest community garden in Cleveland. Our gardeners grow a wide variety of organic vegetables, fruits, berries and flowers. We sell our beautiful produce to the public from 10:00 until 2:00 on Saturdays in August.

Oodles of annuals, small vegetable garden too!

Unique daylily+ garden
- 38 4100 & 4104 John Ave**
Shade garden with path and flower garden with espalier fruit trees; and chickens.
- 39 1722 Randall Road**
Small low maintenance raised front yard garden.
- 40 1715 Randall Rd.**
Small front yard packed with ferns, hostas, and other plantings.
- 41 1723 Randall Rd**
Small cottage garden oasis in the middle of the city. The garden is pollinator-friendly for bees, butterflies, hummingbirds and other beneficial insects. Perennials, bulbs and container gardening are featured.
