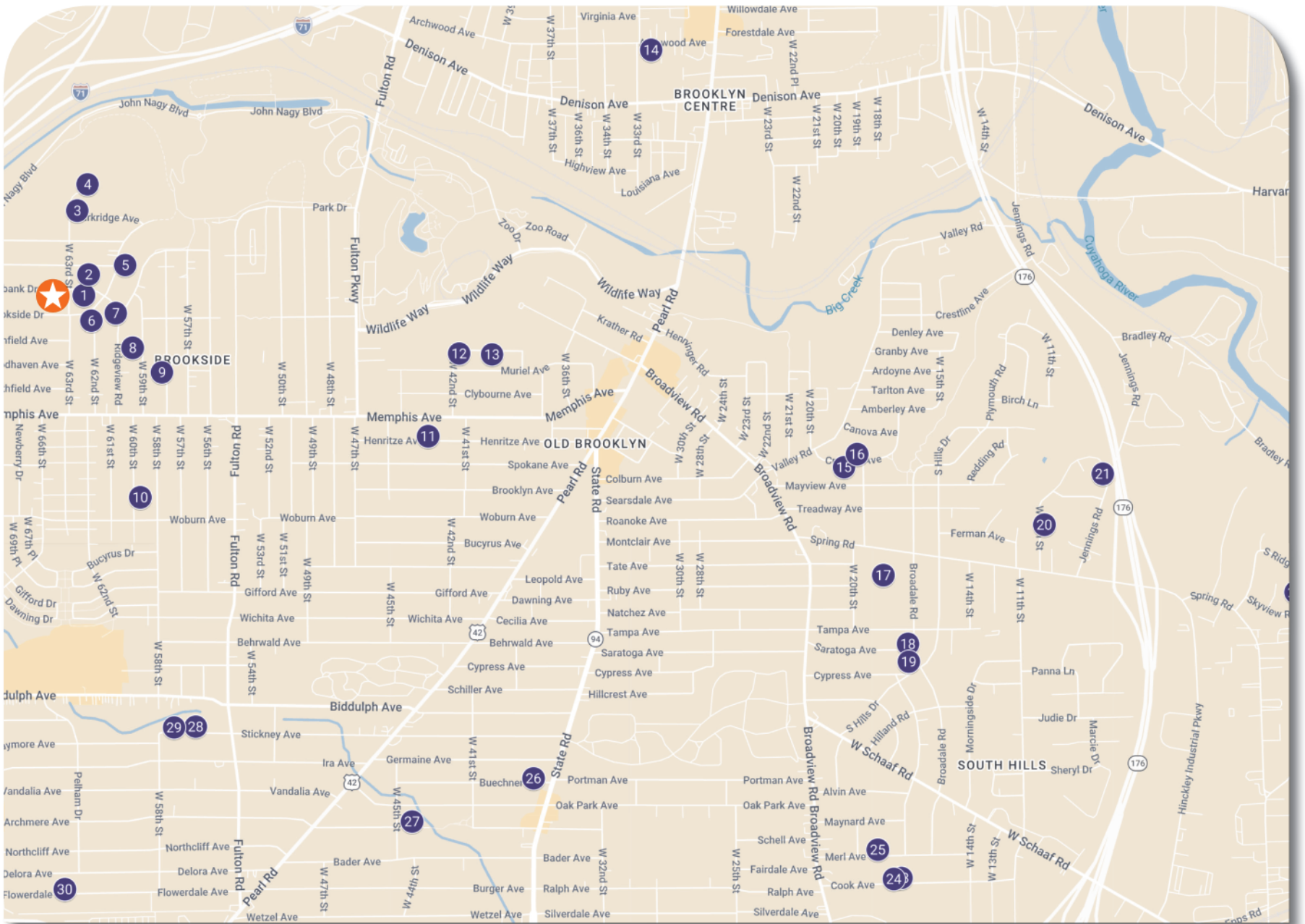

1. 6203 Dellbank Dr

We have been cutting back the yews and reducing the size of our lawns both front and back. We now have evergreen trees and shrubs, young shade trees, fruit trees, berries, vegetables and lots and lots of other wonderful things. As well as a deer resistant front yard full of seasonal color. Keeping all our autumn leaves on site.

2. 6200 Dellbank Dr

A front-yard garden with a little structure and a lot of personality. Curved beds mix tidy shrubs, a bold Japanese maple, and up-and-coming perennials finding their groove. Pops of color keep things lively, while oversized planters and ferns frame a welcoming entry. Clean lines meet playful planting for a space that doesn't take itself too seriously.

3. 6212 Parkridge Ave

My garden is a long term project comprising a pollinator garden that is xeriscaped and also deer proof. Stop by to chat or enjoy my three daughters' lemonade stand!

4. 3996 W 63th St

Deer proof, controlled chaos, whimsical and fun. A forest oasis in the city. Fountain, wild flowers, herbs, flowering perennials. Zen-like aura with pea gravel trails and plenty of seating for pondering as you look into the woods. Good chance you'll see the family of 9 deer that peruse the yard. |W|

5. 5925 Brookside Dr

Be immersed in a wide variety of native plant species starting to bloom. Witness the glory of the dense blazing star. Smell the heady fragrance of lavender that will put you in a state of tranquility. Catch the housecats frolicking outside in their luxury patio. We are slowly freeing ourselves from the tyranny of Kentucky Blue Grass with the midnight hues of ground-creeping ajuga. |N| |W|

6. 6203 Brookside Dr

Corner lot including a Secret Garden. This year's theme colors are purple and coral. All annuals are grown indoors from seeds using grow lights.

7. 4160 Ridgeview Rd

Our Shambala

Using the front yard to draw in pollinators while trying to deter deer. A fun mix of color, herbs, perennials, and some annuals.

8. 4202 W 59th St

A mini home Children's Garden right in the front yard! Wide variety of plants, as well as a fairy garden, and other magical elements.

9. 4232 W 58th St

We invite you into our lush tropical getaway where broadleaf Banana plants sway in the wind. The air is filled with the sweet scent of Hawaiian Plumeria and breathtaking Oleander. Enjoy the elegant stature of palm trees and vibrant annuals and perennial flowers.

10. 4385 W 60th St

Front yard garden mix of raised beds for some food, native perennials, berries, annuals, and bee/butterfly area. |N|

11. 4300 Henritze Ave

I have transformed my small front yard into a native pollinator garden that is a refuge for many pollinators - birds, bees and butterflies. The majority of the plants are native, with a few that were already established when we bought the house. You never know what creature may be visiting the flowers here. |N|

12. 4201 W 42nd St

House is a century home in the Arts & Craftsman style on a corner, so front, side and back yard is on display. Native Ohio plants in our front yard with stone work and vegetable garden. Side yard features ancient ferns. Back yard has a bamboo jungle that I leaned into with a tropical look in decor and plantings.

13. 4009 Pensacola Ave

I have lovely fountain with bridge in a trellis type surrounding featuring lillies, irises, Chantilly lace, and other flowers, also a vegetable garden featuring tomatoes and peppers. It is a certified wildlife habitat across from metropark zoo property, i have a wildflower area next to house with anemones, liatris, ranunculus, ixia and other native plants as well. |N| |W|

14. 3201 Archwood Ave

A lush, expansive garden filled with both sun and shade, blending beautiful, vibrant mature and new native species. Surrounding a 100+ year-old home, this hidden oasis is an unexpected retreat tucked into the heart of one of Cleveland's funkier and most authentically urban neighborhoods. |N|

Starter urban garden focusing on heirloom tomatoes and other veggies, but including some flowers.

Ben Franklin Community Garden

5 acres site with 200 community garden plots, perennial garden, children's garden, demonstration garden and orchard.

18. 4544 Broadale Rd

My garden is eclectic. If I see it and like it, I plant it.

We are experimenting with sneaking edible patches into our urban landscape. We have young espaliered apple trees and a pear tree, and have also been trying to plant more native plants. |N|

My small backyard garden feels like a summer sanctuary humming with life. Raised beds brimming with vegetables climbing their supports, leaves wild & sun-warmed. Colorful flowers draw in bees & butterflies. Hydrangeas blooming in soft blues, pinks & whites. The air carries the scents of rich earth, sweetness from the flowers & green, growing smell of Summer. 28. 5604 Stickney Ave

Flower beds in the front yard line the porch and a protected vegetable garden is located in the backyard.
